

# Porch Party Pointers

ife seems to slow down when we take time to enjoy simple pleasures like sipping a glass of lemonade while a gentle breeze carries conversations through the warm summer air. What better place to find refuge and foster fellowship than in the shade of a veranda?

"A porch is where a home welcomes you with open arms," says Denise Gee, the Dallas-based author of *Porch Parties: Cocktail Recipes and Easy Ideas for Outdoor Entertaining.* "There is something instantly relaxing about it."

It's no surprise, then, that porches are among the gems of the South and have become a focal point for entertaining. Similar to selecting a diamond, Denise suggests following what she describes as her four C's—comfort, color, conviviality, and creativity—for planning and hosting a porch party that sparkles.

#### COMFORT

The beauty of a porch party comes from the informal setting that allows guests to take advantage of the season's lingering daylight. Denise recommends putting the emphasis on the food, beverages, and temperature while letting the space speak for itself as an inviting yet laid-back environment. "Guests are put at ease when they don't feel like everything is too precious or uptight," says Denise, who suggests foods that are easy to access and eat, plenty of seating and tables, and a ceiling fan for particularly hot days. "You want people to feel comfortable."

#### COLOR

Cheerful dabs of color create a welcoming ambience and "[guests] immediately feel like they are in a special place," says Denise. A mix of vivid throw pillows and cushions with cheery tablecloths and linens adds pizzazz



and personalizes porch décor. Food and beverages are also a great way to infuse color imaginatively; Denise likes to float fresh fruit in a bowl of beautiful punch to incorporate a splashy hue. "Great design doesn't need to be [about] how much money you spend on something, but instead, the interest it adds."

#### CONVIVIALITY

Porch living embraces the Southern hospitality we hold so dear and helps to foster a genial mood for a gathering. "Everyone takes the cue from the host," says Denise, "so think about making it fun for yourself and others. Allow yourself to enjoy the party and beautiful surroundings." And while she's a fan of overpreparing, the key is not to let your guests sense all the extra effort—a relaxed hostess makes for a relaxed affair.

#### CREATIVITY

Centering your menu, décor, and music around a theme can give you the opportunity to show off your creativity in a simple and stylish way that appears effortless. For a casual get-together, a refreshing punch, quick nibbles like spiced nuts and pimiento cheese sandwiches, and upbeat tunes contribute to the easygoing mood, while bubbly sippers, hors d'oeuvres, and classical music combine for a more elegant atmosphere.

"It's all about making people feel special and glad they were a part of the party," Denise says. "They met new people, they learned a great recipe or design idea, and most importantly, they felt the love you were dishing out."
